CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC

The coronavirus pandemic's impact on Primavera projects

The coronavirus pandemic has triggered medical, economic, and social crises worldwide. People have found themselves in existential distress because of Covid-19. Many have lost their jobs and, as a result, their livelihoods.

Children and young people have also been severely affected by the pandemic. Kindergartens, schools, universities, and other educational and training facilities have closed, thus also interrupting the daily provision of meals to children, pupils, and students in the institutions.

Particularly in those countries where several projects dedicated to education, training, and health, among other areas, have operated with support over a longer period, Primavera aid is urgently needed and important, given the conditions under the coronavirus.

In **India**, Primavera supports over a thousand children every year and not only they are affected by the coronavirus crisis due to school closures and the resulting restrictions (no more school meals), but also those parents who have lost their jobs as a result of contracting the virus and who can no longer feed their families.

For example, in Bangalore, the Shanti Bhavan boarding school has closed its doors to visitors since March 2020. Since then, teachers and students have been living in the boarding school and are provided with basic food, medicine, and hygiene articles once a week. Furthermore, Primavera continues to pay the teachers.

Primavera had already set up a computer room in the past for the Sri Grameena Vidya Vikasa Kendra (SRGVVK) Trust school. As the school has not yet been reopened, students

In **Brazil** as well, where extremely poor hygiene conditions prevail in the very densely populated favelas, the spread of Covid-19 is accelerating at an alarming rate. Most of the nine centers managed by Primavera are located in or near these slums of Campinas. As a result, more than 1,800 children and young people in the projects are also at risk due to the pandemic. Meanwhile, 63% of parents have lost their jobs and source of income due to the coronavirus crisis, once again underscoring the vulnerability of Brazil's social fabric. In response, Primavera has provided financial support to make disinfectants and protective face masks available quickly. In addition, the parents of those affected are regularly provided with basic foodstuffs or meal stamps. Primavera and other aid organizations have provided laptops to secure supplementary education for children and vocational training for young people affected by the lockdowns, for example in the context of the social project in Vila Verde Curitiba. As a result,

Primavera's projects are likewise affected and the organizations active in the respective countries are faced with massive challenges. In addition, the volume of private donations has fallen sharply and "outside" financial support is lacking.

Donations from Primavera and individual supplementary payments as well as additional support measures from local Bosch companies (e.g. Bosch Thailand) are making a significant contribution to alleviating the difficult situation. To this end, the individual aid measures are designed to meet immediate needs, efficiently implemented, and followed through in line with the respective project objectives.

there can now be taught online using the computers already available.



it has been possible to offer online lessons as well as to continue to offer vocational training courses for various teaching professions in small groups.

The following is a selection of examples from different countries.

Jakarta, Indonesia Bersinar orphanage

The 50 children from problematic social backgrounds living in the orphanage attend local schools and also receive instruction in sports, English, music, and computer science. The new school year started in July and some new students were able to enroll.

This entails costs for school enrollment and fees, school

Munaychay, Peru Corazones para Peru school network

Due to the coronavirus pandemic, Peru is still in a state of emergency with a strictly controlled curfew and schools closed until the end of the year.

This also affects the program of the "Learning with a Heart" schools network that Primavera supports. The educational system (intellectual, cultural, psychological, and social) used in this program helps to enable children and young people to benefit from high-quality education at a later stage. A total of 14 schools are in the network.

Support is specifically targeted at socially disadvantaged families whose children normally have to leave school after the sixth grade in order to work and help provide for their community. Many of them live in rural, inaccessible, and remote regions with a very high proportion of undernourished people.

During normal school hours (from Monday to Friday) the children are provided with healthy food including warm meals.

uniforms, teaching and learning materials, and new laptops for digital education. At the same time, Covid-19 has caused a steep downturn in tourism and the share of private donations has fallen significantly.

Primavera will therefore provide a further 6,000 euros this year so that the project can continue to run with a long-term perspective and in line with the agreed criteria.



Now, however, they have no choice but to stay at home, as schools are expected to remain closed until December of this year, raising pressure further on families who are currently without income as it is.

In order to systematically provide help, it was therefore decided to continue Primavera's support to date, but in a way that is adapted to the current situation. Thus, each family in the project regularly receives food packages containing basic foodstuffs, fresh vegetables, and fruit. They also receive essential hygiene articles. Deliveries on different days and at different times are carefully planned and handled in order to observe lockdown rules.

This means that Primavera's 2020 donation currently supports 1,102 pupils in need, just not directly in schools but rather at home with their families.

Asunción, Paraguay Instituto de Formación Profesional Kolping vocational training project

This project of the Kolping Foundation is exclusively active in the field of vocational training for young people from poor backgrounds in order to pave the way for their later professional life and to help them find well-paid employment.

In response to Covid-19, the government in March decreed the closure of all schools, universities, and other educational institutions with compulsory attendance. This had a corresponding massive impact on the operation of this educational project.

Despite legal regulations, after its transition to online distance learning neither pupils nor parents accepted and made use of the offer to participate in the courses over the internet.

Pattaya, Thailand Hand to Hand project

Pattaya has an international reputation as a vacation resort, but this year the tourists and private donors are staying away. It is well known that many families depend on tourism and have now lost their jobs and their main source of income.

The kindergarten and the school were closed for an extended period, and the families of the 100 children who are looked after by the Hand to Hand project now needed assistance at home, including basic food and hygiene articles. The level of solidarity that everybody showed in the circumstances was extraordinary, including spontaneous, voluntary support activities, such as preparing and handing out warm meals as well as trying out sales ideas (sewing



As a result, both the technical high school program and the technical vocational training in the field of automotive mechanics had to be discontinued on April 30. However, the costs for the teaching staff still had to be paid.

In the meantime, some of the existing offers and courses are being offered on a separate platform. Yet of the 1,879 participants to date, only fewer than 350 are currently making use of the platform. One reason for this might be that the families cannot afford the tuition fees. Kolping Asunción is also seeing large cutbacks in private donations, making it difficult to sustain the level of financial support for families.

In July, the competent ministries granted permission to carry out basic training courses (each lasting five months) as classroom training again in compliance with official hygiene and safety rules. However, only groups of nine students and one teacher are permitted to attend the modular courses.

Primavera is now focusing its support on the payment of tuition fees.



and selling face masks or other handicrafts) the proceeds from which were used to buy urgently needed medicines.

Thanks to these relief actions, it was also possible to support families in the vicinity of the project. In the meantime, the kindergarten and the state school have reopened.

Chiang Mai, Thailand Skills for Life project

The aim of the project is to train young people after they have finished school in various specialist and teaching areas such as health, organic farming, international communication, computer technology, and skilled trades. Primavera covers a share of the costs of teaching and working materials as well as school transport with donations. Bosch Thailand provides support with various training and practical courses and teaching materials.

Here, too, the private donations have decreased sharply. To avoid a complete collapse in the provision of basic needs for local children, the project will receive an additional 5,000 euros this year for the payment of rent, food, school fees, and essential teaching materials for the school. More than that, the additional new teachers also have to be paid.

Moytamadeia near Cairo, Egypt Medical care in Es Salam School

In this issue of our newsletter we also report on this new project in Egypt. The coronavirus pandemic has dramatically worsened the situation of Es Salam School and the children there.

Schools in Cairo are, for the time being, not resuming teaching after the summer holidays as planned. However, the project intends to continue its planned health measures, albeit in an adapted form. The children will be taken to school in accordance with social distancing rules, where they will have a general medical check-up. The dental examination, which was originally planned to be completed in one day, will now be spread over three days. Previously, bus transport was planned to take the children to the ophthalmological examinations and to the optician, but now personal transport will be used. Together with our partner Yalla e. V., we will ensure that the medical and hygiene measures are implemented.

In the meantime, several teachers and staff members of the school have contracted Covid-19 and have fallen ill, which has made it impossible to run the school properly for some time. Local residents in Moytamadeia are also suffering severely from the coronavirus pandemic. Many make a living by collecting and sorting garbage from clubs, theaters, cinemas, hotels, and schools, among other establishments, and selling recyclable materials. Since most of these facilities have had to close down due to the coronavirus pandemic, the garbage collectors (Zabbaleen) have lost their source of income. Not only that, but the prices that can be obtained for recyclable materials have fallen dramatically. The numerous people who have con-

tracted Covid-19 have to pay the costs of testing and medication themselves. This is an enormous financial burden for the Zabbaleen, who were already living in poverty before the crisis.

Some parents would have had to take their children out of the Es Salam School, as they can no longer afford to pay the school fees. This is an area in which Primavera is helping, as the education and therefore the future of these underprivileged children is at stake due to the current crisis. Primavera will make a special donation of 4,900 euros by the end of 2020 so that no child has to leave school due to financial hardship.

Owing to the tense financial situation, many parents also find it difficult to provide their families with the essential basic food. The staff of the NGO EDAM are trying to raise funds from private sponsors to put together food packages for the students. Primavera has also been active in this area and has provided families in need with 4,200 euros for food through EDAM.

Primavera has provided a total of 9,100 euros as a special sum in connection with the coronavirus as relief for the acute plight of the children in Moytamadeia.



NEW PROJECT IN MYOLI CPT CAPE TOWN, SOUTH AFRICA

Better prospects for the children in the township of Khayelitsha, South Africa, through education



It was Bosch associates who founded the association Myoli e. V. Deutschland in 2011 after returning from a business trip. Their objective was to support children and young people in one of the three largest townships in South Africa, Khayelitsha, about 25 kilometers from Cape Town, in a bid to improve their future prospects through education.

Many of the young people under the age of 17 living in the township are orphans. Unemployment is extremely high, and with it poverty, disease, and crime. Those students who have a family often have to work or beg to feed them.

Meanwhile, the project has received support from a sponsorship program and private donors with food packages and the payment of school fees.

Nevertheless, the aid measures are to be stepped up significantly to enable more children to attend school. With this in mind, the NGO Myoli CPT was founded in Cape Town in 2020. There have long been contacts with the local Bosch Automotive office in Cape Town. From 2020, Primavera will bear part of the costs for school uniforms, a starter kit consisting of a rucksack, writing materials, and the costs of tutoring needed by pupils with learning difficulties. Classes are held on Satur-



days and during the school holidays.

NEW PROJECT – ES SALAM SCHOOL CAIRO, EGYPT

An oasis for the children in the middle of a garbage district



school) was founded in 1988 under the initiative of a German nun and is situated like an oasis at the heart of Moytamadeia. Today, the school is run by the NGO EDAM. In all, 430 children, Muslims and Christians, are taught together in grades 1 to 9 and are helped to obtain an intermediate school leaving certificate. In the Sister-Maria-Kindergarten, children are looked after and prepared for school in two groups.

When Roland Müller-Fiedler (secretary on the Primavera executive committee and also the new project’s sponsor) and his wife Eveline Fiedler visited the new aid project in November 2019 during a private trip, there was no reason to suspect that the approval and release of the financial funds by the state authorities in Cairo would take longer than usual.

waste processing districts of Cairo. Several thousand people earn their living here by collecting and sorting garbage. Due to their lack of education, many families have to work as garbage collectors (known as Zabbleen) as the only alternative to unemployment. Many children also have to actively help their families sorting waste.

The medical checkups for children that we are accustomed to are not common in Egypt. Particularly dental hygiene and eye tests pose major challenges. Primavera and Yalla want to fund annual medical and dental checkups as well as eye tests. Furthermore, spectacles, toothbrushes, and toothpaste are provided for the school children.

Roland Müller-Fiedler wanted to get an impression of the two facilities – school and kindergarten –, meet the people responsible, and to agree on the project’s support priorities.

To help people break out of this vicious circle, schools have an important role to play. However, education is a scarce commodity in Moytamadeia. There are no state schools or kindergartens. Consequently, private initiatives are needed. The private Es Salam School (peace

The children, the teachers, and the facilities made a deep impression on the visitors. They are sure that our help is going to people who really need it. Not only that, but it’s also possible to achieve so much here with relatively little money.

He was accompanied by Mr. Tamer Magdy (RBEG/COR) from the regional Bosch organization as well as the president and other staff of the NGO EDAM. Ms. Ulrike Fritz from Yalla e. V. and the German EDAM staff member Mr. Sebastian Drabinski, who has been a strong supporter of the school project for many years, also took part in the discussions. The reception by the children was overwhelming and moved the couple deeply. The children’s cheerful and light-hearted welcome revealed little of the harsh environment in which they grow up. Moytamadeia is namely one of the



REMARKABLE LIVES

In this edition of our newsletter we introduce you to more young people who, with Primavera's project support, have succeeded in leading a self-sufficient and independent life after completing their vocational training. Meet two young women from India and three young men from Paraguay.

Shanti Bhavan Children's Project in Bangalore, India

Sowmani S., aged 24

Born out of wedlock to a young mother who was cast out by her family for that reason, Sowmani Sivakumar had a difficult start in life. Despite hard work in the fields as a child, there was hardly enough food to eat every day.

Admission to the Shanti Bhavan Children's Project proved her salvation, a means of escape from the adverse circumstances she had faced until then, and a source of hope for a better future.

In fact, her good school graduation certificate allowed her to go on to study economics at one of the best universities in Bangalore. Meanwhile, she has found a job in the personnel department of an international corporation. Thanks to the path she has been able to follow in recent

Deepa Academy for the Differently Abled boarding school for visually impaired students in Bangalore, India

Shilpa, aged 26

Established in 2006, the boarding school for visually impaired and blind pupils and young people has been receiving the support of Primavera since 2019.

The aim has always been, and remains, to provide school education and personal development opportunities for the blind participants, most of whom come from rural areas. They all receive an excellent education that allows them to lead self-sufficient lives in society later.

The Deepa Academy for the Differently Abled is situated 15 kilometers from the Shanti Bhavan project. This is where Shilpa went to school.

Blind since birth, the young woman lost her father at an early age and was long denied any education. After her admission to the school for visually impaired girls she not only learned Braille and English, but also acquired computer skills, which she then deepened in a university course and now successfully applies in an IT company.

years, Sowmani is now able to provide her mother not only with moral but also with financial support. The aim of one day building a house for her spurs her on in her work every day.

She is firmly convinced that education is key to building a future in which one can be free and take personal responsibility for one's life.

Her story has also changed attitudes in her home village of Chinnakasinay as regards the role of women and has persuaded the local villagers of the importance of girls attending school and gaining some degree of independence.



Although it is several years since Shilpa graduated from school, she is still involved in the Deepa Academy today: she visits the school frequently and gives voluntary computer lessons or motivational training.

Her career and joie de vivre is a source of inspiration for the more than 200 girls at the Academy and gives them a sense of what they can achieve.



REMARKABLE LIVES

Vocational project: Instituto de Formación Profesional Kolping in Asunción, Paraguay

The project was created for disadvantaged young people in Paraguay's capital, Asunción, with support from Bosch Latin America (RBLA) and Primavera. Sponsored by the Kolping Organization, it allows young people to complete their school education and take a large variety of basic vocational training courses.

This enables them to integrate into working life and become financially independent. Below are three examples of young people who have pursued this path with the support of the project.

Vocational project: Instituto Profesional in Asunción, Paraguay,


Rolando Z. Gomes, aged 29

Rolando has taken part in various training courses in the fields of electronics and electrical engineering, cooling, and solar technology and has continuously developed his skills further on his own initiative in these specialist areas. Today he is self-employed and has a stable customer base who value his reliable and good work. As a result, he has been able to purchase a plot

of land, build a modest house, and lead a dignified life with his family. At present, he is taking courses in solar power technology.

He is very grateful for the support that allows him to attend the vocational training. Without it, he would not be who he is today: a responsible, self-confident, and successful technician.

He also likes to share with other young people his conviction that poverty can only be overcome through education and training.



Angel Gustavo Da Costa Gonzales, aged 26

After his vocational training, Angel first worked in a car repair workshop, where he was able to round out what he had learned with practical experience.

As a result, he was then able to change jobs to a reputable company (a dealership of Mercedes Benz in Paraguay). There, too, he continued to train and qualified as a car mechanic. Backed by the expertise he gained over the years, he was later able to switch jobs and join Automotor SA (a Hyundai center). He is very happy there and his income has also improved considerably.

He is in particular extremely satisfied with and grateful for the support he has received for his vocational training. Without it, he would not have been able to access the labor market and pursue a skilled profession.



Francisco Daniel Bedoya Olmedo, aged 26

Francisco likewise came from a poor background and his parents were also unable to sup-

port his vocational training. Finally, he was accepted in the educational project in Asunción. He completed

courses as a car mechanic for gasoline engines and continued to learn by attending additional special courses. Later, he was able to put the expertise he had acquired up to that point into practice at reputable car repair shops, most recently at an Audi center. In the course of his vocational training, he, too, came to the conclusion that education and training are the key to success. He therefore acquired further qualifications and now holds a position with a high level of responsibility in technical vehicle inspection (primarily trucks and buses). One thing he has learned is that you should never be discouraged and you should keep learning in order to stay abreast of cutting-edge technology. Today, he can not only live from his income but also support his parents.



CONCERT

An unforgettable anniversary concert evening – Beethoven’s 7th Symphony, a work of joy and happiness, and an affirmation of life



The evening of October 2, 2020 will remain an unforgettable event for everybody who was able to attend this moving musical experience with the Bosch Symphony Orchestra. To mark Primavera’s 30th anniversary, we had originally planned a performance of Beethoven’s 9th symphony with about 2,000 guests in Stuttgart’s Liederhalle. Unfortunately, the coronavirus crisis made it impossible to hold a concert of that size owing to the pandemic-response rules applicable to audiences, orchestras, and choirs at that time. However, we remained confident that an alternative solution might potentially be found.

This proved to be the case, as Baden-Württemberg began to relax its pandemic regulations and allowed events with up to 500 participants to be held again, provided social-distancing and hygiene rules were observed. Thus, at the beginning of July 2020, the Bosch Symphony Orchestra was able to announce two performances of a purely orchestral rendition of Beethoven’s 7th Symphony, on October 2, 2020, at 6:00 p.m. and 8:15 p.m. respectively. Welcome news after the long abstinence imposed by the coronavirus.

Both performances were introduced by Christoph Kübel, chairman of Primavera and Stefan Grosch, deputy chairman, who warmly welcomed the guests and set the tone

for the musical fireworks awaiting the audiences. With this composition, Ludwig van Beethoven celebrated one of his greatest successes. To this day, the composition continues to thrill listeners with its motifeme rhythm, the whirling scherzo, and the driving finale. Everybody can intimately appreciate the work “of joy, happiness, and life affirmation.” Hannes Reich, who took over the artistic direction of the Bosch Symphony Orchestra in the fall of 2013, conducted the concert with profound empathy and passion.

The audience was ecstatic, erupting in exulted applause. For their part, the orchestra expressed their gratitude with an encore, the pastorale from Beethoven’s “The Creatures of Prometheus”. Yet aside from the wonderful musical experience, another highlight of the evening was the very pleasing 12,810 euros in net proceeds from receipts, donations, and sales for the benefit of Primavera – Help for Children in Need.

We would like to express our heartfelt gratitude to all guests for their generous donations, to the orchestra and its conductor, as well as to all organizers and helpers who made this music evening possible.

We were therefore all the more pleased that many Primavera friends heard our request to compensate for the anticipated shortfall with a special donation.

Whether large or small donations, the response has shown how, in difficult times like the coronavirus pandemic, Primavera friends are willing to help spontaneously and support the children and young people in the projects. We appreciate this very much and thank you most sincerely. Unfortunately, we have had to cancel some concerts originally planned for the remainder of the year, and those

that do go ahead will be before reduced audience numbers with a corresponding decrease in donation proceeds expected.

The unprecedented challenges we face as we try to provide support in the countries or projects that are particularly affected by Covid-19 will probably continue for a longer period of time, and every donation for Primavera helps to ensure that the projects can continue to receive long-term support.

Please continue to help the many children and young people who urgently need our support right now.
